Founded in 1878, Lincoln University continues to achieve international recognition for its teaching and research activities.

The University excels in areas related to resource management and is world renowned in areas such as agricultural science; bio-protection technologies; horticulture; viticulture and oenology; environmental management; and landscape architecture.

Student Support

Lincoln University is proud of its record in looking after international students. Student Learning Centre

The Student Learning Centre provides a variety of free programmes and resources to help students maximise their academic potential. Teaching and learning support is offered to students requiring assistance with their study.

English Language Training

For applicants who do not meet English Language entry requirements at the time of applying, Lincoln University's English Language and Foundation Studies Centre provides a formal 16-week university qualification, the Certificate in English for Academic Purposes. This programme contains academic and professional electives and is recognised by all New Zealand universities.

Accommodation

Students in the fully catered Halls of Residence have their own furnished rooms with shared laundry and bathroom facilities. Students also have a self-catered option or can organise their own accommodation off-campus. To help students integrate into university life, a full calendar of social, sporting and cultural events and activities is on offer.

Admission Requirements

Study Abroad students need to have a minimum Grade Point Average (GPA) score of 2.75. Students with a lower GPA can apply and be assessed on a case-by-case basis. For more information, contact the Study Abroad Co-ordinator.
