The English language pathway programs for pre-university, undergraduate and postgraduate courses include English for Academic Purposes and English for Tertiary Preparation.

For undergraduate university entry the International College offers Foundation programs; University Diplomas in Business, Information Technology and Creative Industries; and University Certificate in Tertiary Preparation programs.

For postgraduate university entry the International College offers a University Certificate in Tertiary Preparation and Postgraduate Pathways programs in Business and Information Technology.


QUT International College also offers English Language Programs including General English and the Cambridge First Certificate in English Preparation course, for students wishing to improve their English for personal or professional development.

LIVING AND LEARNING IN BRISBANE



Brisbane is one of Australia's most liveable cities, boasting a warm climate, friendly people and a relaxed lifestyle. Compared to most other Australian capital cities the cost of living in Brisbane is relatively low. This makes it a very popular destination for international students. Brisbane is the state capital of Queensland and Australia's third largest city, with an exciting multicultural community of around 1.8 million people.

Brisbane has a vibrant and diverse social and cultural life; from street markets, music festivals and nightclubs, to galleries, theatres and restaurants; Australia's most liveable city has something for everyone. Brisbane is located approximately one hour from Sydney, and two hours from Melbourne, when travelling by air.

Excluding tuition fees, international students typically need a minimum of A\$16,500 a year to live comfortably in Brisbane. These costs will vary, depending on the choice of accommodation, location, and lifestyle. The main living expenses most students need to consider are accommodation, food, transport, telephone and electricity.

Queensland is home to some of Australia's most famous attractions; from natural wonders such as the Great Barrier Reef and Fraser Island, to theme and wildlife parks such as Wet'n'Wild, Seaworld, Dreamworld, Movie World and Australia Zoo.

Queensland is renowned for its range of natural beauty; from its spectacular, white sandy beaches and pristine rainforests and hinterland, to its wide-open countryside and vast outback. The famous beaches of the Sunshine Coast and Gold Coast are less than an hour's drive from Brisbane city. Moreton Island is also a short distance from Brisbane, and features crystal-clear water and impressive sand dunes.







Cost of living

International students should allow a minimum of A\$16,500 per year for living expenses. Below are costs which students need to consider when budgeting for their living costs.

Travel between campuses










QUT International College offers a variety of intensive language courses ranging from English language skills for academic study or business, to general English language skills for social, cultural and personal enrichment.

The highly qualified staff who teach in the programs are experienced in teaching students from different countries. Teaching is conducted in small groups, allowing opportunity for language practice and individual guidance.

These features, combined with the latest computer and audiovisual resources for English language learning, help ensure students make rapid progress.

QUT International College has a supervised Independent Learning Centre to help students improve individual language skills, a language laboratory to develop fluency and accuracy in speaking and listening, and computer laboratories to enable students to access computer-based study programs.

All QUT International College students have access to the Internet and email, and these form part of the English language courses.

Duration: five-week program, 25 hours per week.

Commences: Nine sessions each year. See Page 16 for QUTIC 2010 Commencement dates.

Academic requirements: There are no specific requirements.

English requirements: There are no specific requirements.

Designed for:

- Students preparing for entry to English for Academic Purposes, Foundation or University Diploma courses, and QUT degree programs.
- Students seeking to improve their English language proficiency and experience Australian culture.

General English programs are suitable for students at all levels of English, from Elementary to Advanced. These courses will help students to develop the core skills of reading, writing, speaking and listening, and will help them to improve fluency and accuracy. Students also have the option to attend Internet-based TOEFL (iBT) preparation classes. General English programs can also prepare students to take other International College language programs including the Cambridge First Certificate in English Preparation course.

The General English course includes:

- Integrated skills: Based on up-todate, high interest textbooks, this unit effectively and progressively develops students' abilities in all four macro-skills: speaking, listening, reading and writing.
- Grammar in context: English grammar is taught and practised in 'authentic' situations relevant to students' real-life needs.
- Vocabulary development: Students progressively increase their vocabulary by exploring a wide range of topics relevant to their everyday needs and interests.
- Language Laboratory: All classes have weekly lessons in our new state-of-theart multimedia Language Laboratory to assist in the development of students' speaking and listening skills.
- Independent Learning Centre (ILC) program: In addition to weekly lessons in the ILC as part of the General English program, the comprehensively resourced ILC is available for private, individual student use outside class time.

- Computing skills development: All classes have weekly Computer Assisted Language Learning (CALL) lessons to enable students to make the most effective use of QUT's sophisticated learning technology and educational applications on the Internet.
- Regular progress tests and individual counselling: Progress tests are conducted at the conclusion of each five-week session. All General English students receive a Progress Report, including teachers' written comments, at the end of every session. Teachers, Coordinators and our Student Welfare Adviser are available for academic and personal counselling.
- Field trips: Not all language learning occurs in the classroom. Students regularly visit businesses, factories and other venues to practise 'real-life' language in authentic situations.
- Cultural studies: Because language and culture are so closely connected, the General English program includes visits to sites of cultural significance such as museums, art galleries and community groups.
- Social and recreational activities: As well as enjoying class-based social activities, students can also join in the regular social and recreational activities offered by QUT's International Student Services (ISS).

Duration: 10-week program, 25 hours per week.

Commences: Subject to demand

Academic requirements: There are no specific requirements.

English requirements: Intermediate to upper-intermediate level English language skills.

Designed for: Students seeking to improve their English language proficiency in a business context.

The English for Business course is offered to students, subject to demand, as an alternative stream of General English. In the English for Business course, students learn practical and useful English for international business communication, to enhance professional skills and career potential. As part of the English for Business course, students can prepare for the TOEIC test.

The English for Business course includes:

- · Business meetings skills
- · Job interview skills
- Giving presentations
- · Using Internet and email
- · Understanding data and statistics
- · Problem resolution
- Negotiation skills
- Case studies
- · Business letters, memos and faxes
- Socialising.

Cambridge First Certificate in English Preparation

AN INTERNATIONALLY RECOGNISED QUALIFICATION IN ENGLISH

Duration: 12-week program, 25 hours per week.

Commences: March and September

Academic requirements: There are no specific requirements.

English requirements:

- External students are required to have either an IELTS score of 5.0 (with subscores of 5.0 in reading and writing); or TOEFL 500 (paper) or 173 (CBT) with TWE (3), or 60 (iBT) (with sub-scores of at least 18 in writing and reading); or approved equivalent. All external students are also required to take a QUTIC Placement Test, administered on their first day at the International College.
- Internal students are required to have successfully completed the intermediate level of General English and the QUTIC Placement Test.

Designed for:

- Students preparing for the Cambridge First Certificate in English examination.
- Students seeking to improve their English language proficiency in an Australian cultural and educational context.

The Cambridge First Certificate in English is used by organisations around the world as the benchmark of language proficiency. When looking for employment at home or abroad, the Cambridge First Certificate in English is a valuable addition to any résumé or Curriculum Vitae (CV).

This program is recommended for students wanting to improve their English language ability or prepare for the Cambridge First Certificate in English (CFCE) examination. This intensive course covers the core skills of speaking, listening, reading, and writing, as well as use of English. Classes focus on examination strategies and skills.

QUT International College provides group study tours and short courses that combine English language tuition with a variety of cultural, recreational, or academic programs. Study tour groups can combine language studies with study in disciplines such as Information Technology, Business and Creative Industries. The International College can also include excursions and other recreational activities with your language studies. At various dates throughout the year, study groups can be integrated into regular General English programs. Institutions or interested groups can contact the International College to arrange one of these flexible programs.

Study tours are also available to groups that do not require English language tuition but who wish to study academic units, culture and/or recreational activities.

English for Academic Purposes (EAP)

UPGRADE YOUR ENGLISH ABILITY TO MEET UNIVERSITY REQUIREMENTS

Enrolment Fee: \$100

Duration: 12-week program, 25 hours per week.

Commences: February, July, October

Academic requirements: A conditional offer for a QUT Foundation, University Diploma or degree program. Students without a conditional offer who wish to improve their academic English may also apply if they meet the English language entry requirements.

English requirements:

 Degree students: successful completion of the EAP entry test; or an IELTS score of at least 5.5 (with reading and writing sub-scores of at least 5.5 and no other sub-scores below 5.0); or TOEFL 525 (paper) or 193 (CBT) or 70 (iBT) (with sub-scores of at least 18 in reading and writing and 17 or more in listening and speaking); or approved equivalent. Foundation/University Diploma students: successful completion of the EAP entry test; or an IELTS score of at least 5.0 (with reading and writing sub-scores of at least 5.0); or TOEFL 500 (paper) or 173 (CBT) or 60 (iBT) (with sub-scores of at least 18 in writing and reading); or approved equivalent.

Designed for: The EAP course is designed to prepare students for independent study and to familiarise them with an Australian academic setting in terms of study techniques and student/lecturer relations and expectations.

The EAP course has its own internal assessment. Successful completion of the course provides a pathway into Foundation, University Diploma, University Certificate in Tertiary Preparation or QUT undergraduate or postgraduate award programs^o with an English requirement of up to IELTS 6.5 or equivalent for students who meet the academic requirements for these programs.

 Students who wish to gain entry into QUT degree programs that require an IELTS 7.0 or higher (or equivalent) will be required to provide an IELTS/ TOEFL result at this level for admission into these programs.

Duration: 24-week program, 25 hours per week.

Commences: March, July, November

Academic requirements: A conditional offer for a QUT degree program. Students without a conditional offer who wish to improve their academic English may also apply if they meet the English language entry requirements.

English requirements: Successful completion of the EAP entry test; or an IELTS score of at least 5.0 (with reading and writing sub-scores of at least 5.0); or TOEFL 500 (paper) or 173 (CBT) or 60 (iBT) (with sub-scores of at least 18 in writing and reading); or approved equivalent.

Designed for: EAP Plus has been specifically developed for students who wish to commence their entry into an English for Academic Purposes course earlier. Successful applicants can enter the course at pre-intermediate level and immediately begin developing their English language and study skills in an academic context.

After completing the English and Bridging (now called University Certificate in Tertiary Preparation) programs at the International College, I felt more confident and equipped to undertake a PhD in English. Learning and improving my grammar, vocabulary and writing skills is essential preparation for when I come to write my thesis. The friendly teachers, and the excellent resources and facilities have kept me motivated to improve my English language skills. Although I am now studying in the faculty, I still keep in contact with my teachers at the College.



During the first 12 weeks of the EAP Plus course, students will develop their paragraph writing, reading, listening and note-taking skills through theme-based topics at an introductory academic level, along with speaking and oral presentation skills in a highly-supported environment. Weekly grammar, paraphrasing and vocabulary development supports the reading, writing and note-taking components. Reading skills are also enhanced via extended reading practice and specific reading skills lessons.

The second 12 weeks of the course will further develop independent study skills enabling students to operate effectively in an Australian academic setting in terms of study techniques and student/lecturer relations and expectations.

EAP Plus has its own internal assessment. Successful completion of the EAP Plus course provides a pathway into QUT undergraduate and postgraduate award programs[•] with an English requirement of up to IELTS 6.5 or equivalent for students who meet the academic requirements for these programs.

The EAP and EAP Plus courses include:

- Academic reading and note-making: Students' reading and note-making skills are developed through the use of the latest academic English resources and relevant authentic texts.
- Academic writing: Students are carefully and progressively guided through all stages of academic writing from sentence and paragraph level to the creation of a complete academic assignment.
- Listening and note-taking from lectures: Academic listening skills are developed through specifically designed learning

tasks and resources, as well as real and simulated lectures.

- Speaking in academic settings: Through instruction, modelling and practice, the course aims to develop students' competence and confidence in speaking in academic environments.
- Seminars and presentations: The course effectively builds students' skills in tutorial seminars and other oral presentations, from initial preparation to final delivery.
- Academic study skills: Students learn how to study effectively, manage their time and prioritise multiple tasks.

Unit synopses

Academic English 1

This unit is designed to help students communicate successfully in a variety of situations. This includes the fundamentals of oral and written communication set within the context of a number of academic situations; effective listening skills; knowledge of how to conduct a seminar; the gathering of information from a variety of sources and its organisation for specific purposes; the various writing genres; and the correct use of conventions in the English language.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 6 per week

Academic English 2

This unit promotes clear and concise writing in particular genres (essays, assignments and reports) pertinent to undergraduate study; mastery of basic primary and secondary research skills related to assignment tasks; effective oral communication in seminar presentations and tutorial discussion; effective listening in lecture situations; and answering exam questions with an awareness of relevance and time management.

Prerequisite: Academic English 1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 5 per week

Accounting 1

This unit introduces the essential concepts of debit and credit; processing of financial transactions via journals and ledger through to trial balance for a sole-trading enterprise (including GST); end of accounting period adjustments and final reports (specifically, the preparation of Profit and Loss statements and Balance Sheets); and accounting controls over cash.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 5 per week

Accounting 2

This unit examines various accounting sub-systems such as 10-column worksheets, control accounts and subsidiary ledgers; inventory and fixed asset systems; accounting for credit transactions; budgeting; and financial analysis techniques useful for management.

Prerequisite: Accounting 1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Chemistry

This unit prepares students for tertiary study in the applied sciences and provides a solid foundation in basic chemistry and experimental techniques; elements, atoms and ions, and modern atomic theory; chemical bonding; inorganic compounds; chemical reactions and energy; water and solutions; gases; acids and bases; oxidationreduction reactions and electrochemistry; reaction rates and chemical equilibrium; and introductory organic chemistry.

Prerequisite: Physical Sciences 1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 5 per week

Economics 1

This unit introduces students to major economic issues; the basics of economic literacy necessary for future tertiary studies, the main economics systems; and the purpose of a five-sector model and the functions and characteristics of each sector. It also provides students with a working knowledge of the global economy; and an understanding of economic problems with particular reference to Australia.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Economics 2

This unit introduces students to the study of macroeconomics. Topics include the five-sector model, the trade cycle, inflation and unemployment, government policy, and the external sector.

Prerequisite: Economics 1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Foundation English

This unit is designed to continue the development of reading, writing, speaking and listening skills in English to prepare students for further studies in Foundation Academic English units. A variety of everyday literature and real-life situations will be incorporated, with the emphasis being on active participation by students, both as individuals and as group members. Such activities will provide students with the skills to explore and use the English language in different contexts. Basic computing skills for word processing and the use of QUT computing services will also be developed.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Information Processing

This unit introduces students to a range of problem-solving techniques and shows how these can be used to solve various problems using an object-oriented programming language; the foundation of relational databases in terms of storing, altering and retrieving information, using SQL for its implementation; and provides a basis for the specification and implementation of information systems using relational algebra.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Intrernational Perspectives

Students are introduced to economic, social, cultural, political and environmental issues which impact on them as individuals and as global citizens. The unit will develop students' ability to consider and share their views on different issues. The unit emphasises action research on current issues in Australia and overseas.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Introduction to Creativity

In this unit, students are introduced to theories of creativity and investigate the nature of creative culture and practice. The unit provides students with opportunities to analyse creative applications, ideas and concepts in a range of industries.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Life Science

This unit examines the themes of life, macromolecules, metabolism, cell structure, cell processes, biological diversity, and plant and animal physiology. The unit emphasises practical skills, both in the laboratory and in the field.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Mathematics A1

This unit teaches the basic rules of arithmetic; ratios; percentages and proportion; introduction to statistics; averages and interpretation of graphs; dispersion and graphical display; probability; arrangements and combinations; basic measurement; area and volume; spending; borrowing money; and investment.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week



Mathematics A2

This unit focuses on basic algebra; introduction to trigonometry; normal distribution; regression analysis; binomial distribution; inferential statistics; earning money; interest; and annuities.

Prerequisite: Mathematics A1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 5 per week

Mathematics B1

This unit focuses on basic algebra; equations (including simultaneous equations); functions (including polynomials, exponential, logarithmic) and their graphs; growth and decay; introduction to trigonometry; factorisation; analytical geometry; averages; interpretation of graphs; and probability.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Mathematics B2

This unit focuses on rate of change; the derivative; stationary points; curve sketching; optimisation; integration; probability distribution; the binomial distribution; normal distribution; hypothesis testing; dispersion; and graphical display.

Prerequisite: Mathematics B1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 5 per week

Organisations and Management

This unit is designed to develop students' understanding of the significant role organisations play in many facets of our lives, how organisations function, and what is involved in working organisations. The emphasis is on skills that are needed at all levels and in all areas of an organisation. Students will develop a range of skills required by the individual to function effectively in teams and in an organisation.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Physical Sciences 1

This unit introduces students to scientific study and research processes and the basic principles underlying physics and chemistry; heat and temperature; geometric properties of light; reflection and refraction; diffraction and interference; electricity and magnetism; the atom; chemical periodicity; chemical names and formulas; chemical bonding; chemical quantities; chemical reactions; stoichiometry; thermochemistry; the behaviour of gases; water and aqueous systems; and properties of solutions.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Physics

This unit introduces students to mechanics, sound, light, electricity, magnetism, electronics, and nuclear physics. Relevance to real-world activities is stressed by discussing the various applications of concepts learned.

Prerequisite: Physical Sciences 1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 5 per week

Professional Studies

In this unit, students investigate the nature of problem solving within creative structures and frameworks. Students work in a team environment using critical thinking and problem-solving frameworks to inform the development of a product or outcome. The unit provides students with individual and group problem-solving models, lateral thinking strategies and group work skills.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Tertiary Preparation Studies 1

This unit introduces students to the study and learning skills required in an Australian university, as well as providing students with an understanding of the Australian culture and society. It includes the following topics: Australia's Indigenous People; a brief review of Australian history; the family and multiculturalism; using the computer to gather information and communicate in an academic environment; and assignment presentation, study skills and examination techniques.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 5 per week

Tertiary Preparation Studies 2

This unit further develops the skills initiated in Tertiary Preparation Studies 1, with a focus on the Australian government and law; foreign policy and trade; current affairs; Australian politics; and preparation and presentation of both oral and written material.

Prerequisite: Tertiary Preparation Studies 1 or equivalent studies. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Extension English Classes - 'English Club'

For first-semester students, these classes take place during weeks two to eight. Other QUTIC students in University Entry Programs may join the classes, if their timetable permits. Classes take the form of an 'English Club' where students can improve their grammar, writing, speaking and other language skills in a relaxed environment.

The English Club classes are recommended to students whose results fall below the average in the English Language essay, which is administered to all new students during the orientation program.

Unit synopses

Accounting

Accounting data is the basis for decision making in any organisation. Accordingly, the aim of this unit is to provide students with some basic knowledge of modern financial and managerial accounting theory and practice so they can understand how accounting data is used to help make decisions in organisations. This unit covers financial procedures and reporting for business entities; and the analysis and interpretation of financial statements for planning, control and business decision-making purposes.

Credit Points: 12

Contact Hours: 4 per week

Economics

This unit introduces students to key economic concepts and their practical applications. It comprises 12 topics, each focusing on a current economic issue. Microeconomic topics include demand and supply, elasticity, production and cost theory, and market structure. Macroeconomic topics include measuring GDP, inflation and unemployment, money and banking, and fiscal and monetary policy.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Global Business

In this globalised environment there is a growing interdependency among people and institutions around the world. This unit examines the drivers of globalisation and the diversity of country markets at an introductory level. It develops the skills and understanding to identify and respond to the opportunities, challenges and risks of conducting business across politically, economically and culturally diverse environments. An authentic country feasibility study is undertaken to help identify where a firm can find opportunities both in terms of actual and potential markets and the location for value-adding activities.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week



Management

The unit provides an introduction to the theories and practice of management and organisations. Emphasis is on the conceptual and people skills that will be needed at all areas of management and in all areas of organisational life. The unit acknowledges that organisations exist in an increasingly international environment where the emphasis will be on knowledge, the ability to learn, to change and to innovate. Organisations are viewed from individual, group, corporate and external environmental perspectives.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Marketing

This introductory unit examines the role and importance of marketing to the contemporary organisation. Emphasis is given to understanding the basic principles and practices of marketing such as the marketing concept, market segmentation, marketing information systems and consumer behaviour. The unit explores the various elements of the marketing mix, with special reference to product, price, distribution, and promotion. Promotion includes advertising and public relations. By way of introduction only, key issues relating to services marketing, strategic marketing and marketing planning are also canvassed.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Professional Communication 1

Focuses on the macro skills of listening, reading, writing and speaking; establishes techniques for extending vocabulary; uses spoken and written texts of an academic nature to summarise, analyse, make inferences and recognise key concepts; incorporates strategies for effective group participation in a cross-cultural context; and helps students learn techniques for writing successfully in genres appropriate to their field of study.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Professional Communication 2

This unit further explores vocabulary, grammar and academic genres to develop skills of speaking and writing. Effective speaking skills are developed according to academic and professional presentation requirements. Skills for coherent and well-structured writing are also extended to enable efficient essay writing and the refinement of exam techniques. Language and structure appropriate to commercial, technical and academic communication are developed in support of faculty studies.

Prerequisite: Professional Communication 1 or equivalent. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Working in Business

This unit will help you to kickstart your study and your career in business regardless of your specific discipline. Not only does 'Working in Business' give you an understanding of where business has come from and where it is headed, but you will also gain insights into yourself and how you can develop as both a student and professional in the business world. It covers an overview of business, the important issues for working as a professional in an organisation, and also gives you the opportunity to reflect on your own skills, preferences and career options so you can plan a future that suits you.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Database Systems

The aim of this unit is to introduce you to the structure and role of databases in modern businesses.

Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

IT Professional Studies

This unit aims to develop students' professional skills and capabilities by providing theoretical and practical opportunities in the following areas: how IT teams operate; effective oral and written communication; team meeting processes and procedures; ethical and social responsibilities of the IT professional; information literacy; and traits for lifelong learning. Demonstrable competency in these areas will be an expectation in subsequent units and will be further developed.

Networks

The aim of the unit is to provide an introductory study of computer networks within the IT profession.

Object Oriented Programming

This unit aims to develop students' software design and development skills gained in Problem Solving and Programming, taking students from procedural programming and problem solving into an objectoriented approach. This unit is required by all IT majors, and is designed to be complementary to the Modelling, Analysis and Design unit. Students will use industry standard design and implement a real-life software application. Students will gain a solid foundation in the principles of objectoriented programming, including encapsulation, polymorphism and inheritance, which will allow them to solve real-world problems using the Object-Oriented design paradigm.

Prerequisite: Problem Solving and Programming or equivalent. Credit Points: 12 Contact Hours: 4 per week

Problem Solving and Programming

This unit aims to give students a positive introduction to the analytical skills required in computer programming. It assumes that students have little or no previous programming experience. The unit emphasises generic programming concepts and related problem-solving strategies. The skills learnt in the unit will be applicable to a wide range of commonly used, industrially significant programming and scripting languages.

Professional Communication 1

Systems Architecture

This unit introduces students to the challenging field of Systems Architecture, and provides students with practical skills in using a range of modern computer operating systems through the presentation of case studies involving current technology and their relationship and interconnection within a contemporary computer systems architecture.

All international students (including students studying in any institution in Australia) who wish to study:

- English plus a QUT academic program should complete the 'Application for English Language Programs' form and the QUT 'F' form.
- English only should complete the 'Application for English Language Programs' form.
- Foundation, University Diploma, University Certificate in Tertiary Preparation or Business Postgraduate Pathway Program and a degree program should complete the QUT 'F' form.

All international students entering University Entry Program (UEP) courses must meet the UEP minimum English language requirements prior to the commencement of their course. They must also study full-time in order to comply with one of the requirements of their Australian student visa (unless they hold another temporary visa allowing study). Applications are processed throughout the year and there is no closing date for the receipt of applications. However, prospective students are advised to apply well in advance of their proposed start date, as there may be considerable delays when applying for their Australian student visa.
