The most famous are the Adelaide Festival of Arts, the Adelaide Fringe, the Adelaide Film Festival, Cabaret Festival, International Guitar Festival and world music festival, WOMAdelaide.



MAJOR SPORTING ATTRACTIONS

The Tour Down Under, the first ProTour cycling race to be held outside Europe, brings the world's cycling elite to race through the streets of Adelaide. UniSA sponsors the Australian national team and is a huge participant in the entire eight-day cycling calendar. Other major events include the Clipsal 500, an adrenalin-charged V8 street race; the Classic Adelaide car rally; and the Panasonic World Solar Challenge, where brains and sun combine to power cars that race through the outback from Darwin to Adelaide.



DIVERSE ECONOMY

This state is known for its rich and diverse economy, producing about 50% of Australia's wine. It has a vibrant defence and Information Technology industry, is a major agricultural and horticultural producer and home to a successful mining industry.

The Study Abroad fee is a flat fee that does not vary with changes to academic course load. For students from the United States, you may be able to apply for Financial Aid towards your Study Abroad program. For further information, please ask your home institution.

In South Australia, international students are offered the same public transport discounts as local students (a saving of hundreds of dollars every year) unlike students in some other states.

GLOBAL EXPERIENCE PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Business Divisional Office

Prerequisite(s): One semester of successful university study

Snapshot: Still not decided on your career or profession? This course will equip you with the tools to help you strategically manage your career beyond the borders of a single organisation and learn the skills to network effectively with people from different linguistic and cultural backgrounds.



Practical Component: Over the course of seminars and through a series of activities, workshops and a group project, you will encounter a range of scenarios designed to develop the skills of networking, career management and intercultural communication. You will also have the opportunity to meet guest speakers from local industry and choose your study options to customise the course.

ENTREPRENEURIAL ENTERPRISES

School of Management

Prerequisite(s): One year of successful university study

Snapshot: Always coming up with new ideas? This course allows you to explore the process and strategy of turning ideas and innovation into reality.

Practical Component: Working in a team of 5 to 6 students, you'll explore creative processes and the entrepreneurial mind, to develop a feasibility plan for a new product not yet available in the local market. You will carry out interviews of the general public to determine the feasibility of your venture, supported by classroom role-playing exercises to prepare you and your team for successful research.

DIGITAL PHOTOGRAPHY

School of Art, Architecture & Design

Prerequisite(s): Nil

Snapshot: Handy with a camera or want to learn? In this course you will learn the basics of digital imaging principles, managing images, scanning, using digital cameras, retouching, colour correction, basic composition and inkjet printing.

Practical Component: Students produce original work in studios for 4.5 hrs a week developing problem solving skills and engaging with real-life situations. After mastering the basics students work towards a final project.

politics, land and boundaries, art and much more, providing you with a great insight into Aboriginal people and their history.

Practical Component: A 2-day overnight trip to Camp Coorong plus half day trips to: Living Kurna Cultural Centre, Kurna Walking Trail, Nunkuwarrin Yunti (Aboriginal Health Organisation) and various art venues around Adelaide.

CODE: HUMS 1035



LANDSCAPE HAZARDS AND DISASTERS

School of Natural and Built Environments

Prerequisite(s): Nil

Snapshot: Ever wondered about how earthquakes, tsunamis, volcanoes, cyclones, tornados, extraterrestrial hazards, biohazards and climate change occur? In this course you will explore the triggers, planning, mitigation and assessment disaster response and social impacts of these natural hazards and disasters.

Practical Component: Field trips to the BOM (Bureau of Meteorology) severe weather desk, the SES state emergency control centre and the River Torrens flood mitigation weir plus group and individual exercises.

CODE: EART 2011



MOBILE ENTERPRISE WORKSHOP

School of Computer and Information Science

Prerequisite(s): Successful completion of second year of an appropriate undergraduate program plus an additional application, which will be assessed on features such as the quality of their ideas, positive attitude, entrepreneurial spirit and relevant background and skills.

Snapshot: Are you mobile savvy? This workshop provides an opportunity for UniSA students to engage with other students, members of industry, and the public to develop an idea for a product or service in the mobile digital technology field.

Practical Component: In conjunction with MegaSA, Australia's leading entrepreneurship and mentor based program for mobile phone content and applications, students will be exposed to the development of innovative business ideas on mobile phones. This is not designed as a technical course, but rather learning how to extend ideas to be proper business proposals.

CODE: INFS 4017



GROUP DYNAMICS

School of Health Sciences

Prerequisite(s): Nil

Snapshot: Interested in lacrosse or passionate about managing sports teams? This course will allow you to manage your own teams for a lacrosse tournament held at the end of the study period and in the process learn the nature of group dynamics and its significance to life contexts.

Practical Component: Students build their own teams, organise coaching schedules, and participate in game play as a practical demonstration of the principles behind forming cohesion of groups in a sporting context. Students also participate in Group Adventure Initiative Tasks that involve active engagement in problem solving tasks, leadership and development of team work. There is an option to participate in a camp in the local hills involving bushwalking, team challenges, high ropes and community service as a way of extending personal responsibility and group work.

INTRODUCTION TO OUTDOOR LEADERSHIP

School of Health Sciences


Prerequisite(s): Nil

Snapshot: Are you the outdoors type? In this course you will take kayaking and bushwalking field trips to various locations in South Australia.

Practical Component: Students form groups within which they take on roles of leadership and learn the practical skills required to organise and lead an outdoor field trip, whilst learning about the natural environment and local history of the area. Field trips allow students to put into practice theoretical skills and give a broad practical base in which to contextualise information learnt in the course.

WHAT'S THE COURSE LOAD AT UNISA?

A normal course load at UniSA is 18 units (usually 4 courses each worth 4.5 units) per Study Period (semester) or 36 units (usually 8 courses worth 4.5 units) per academic year. The fee for one Study Period is a standard fee and does not vary with changes to course load.



Course codes comprise 4 letters and

4 numbers (e.g. TOUR 1001). Courses beginning with a "1" are generally first year level, courses beginning with a "2" are generally second year level, etc.




Course codes beginning with a "4 or 5" are






When you come to study at UniSA, you will be able to mix with fellow students from Australia and all over the world. The UniSA Students



TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR THE STUDY ABROAD PROGRAM, YOU MUST:

- ✓ *be a high school graduate or currently enrolled in a university or college (in either undergraduate or postgraduate studies);*
- ✓ *be in good academic standing; and*
- ✓ *have a good understanding of English – if English is not your first language, you must have an IELTS score of 6.0 or higher, or TOEFL score of 550 (paper based), 213 (computer based), or 79 (internet based).*

APPLICATION DEADLINES

Your application should reach the University of South Australia at least two months before you wish to commence your studies:




Students in countries with lengthy visa procedures are encouraged to apply at least six months before their intended starting date.

If you choose to study abroad, one of the first things you will want to do is find somewhere suitable to live. It's an exciting challenge to immerse yourself in a new culture and it's important you have a comfortable place to call home while you are studying.

Choosing somewhere to live is a major investment, so it's important that you gather as much information as you can before making a final decision. Be prepared to research all of your options before you decide on a place, taking into account your budget, tastes and lifestyle.

When you come to Adelaide to study, you can choose from a number of

different accommodation options to suit your needs. Whether you would like to live alongside your campus, in the city or near the beach, we will try to help you find something suitable.

UniSA has a dedicated Accommodation Service with support staff who can help you navigate through the various possibilities. We have included a guide to the types of accommodation available below, but you are encouraged to visit our website for full details to help you find the option that is most suitable for you. Student apartments, student hostels and residential colleges found on

the accommodation website have been inspected by UniSA staff, are considered appropriate for student use and can be booked before arrival in Adelaide. UniSA web-links to these providers are legitimate. Please beware of false rental advertisements commonly found on external share accommodation websites.

DEDICATED STUDENT ACCOMMODATION

Student Hostels

Student hostels are great places to meet people and create a friendship network from your new home. Hostels provide fully furnished single rooms with access to shared facilities such as kitchen, bathroom and recreational areas. Some also offer double and triple rooms. Students enjoy an independent living environment, although supervision is provided in some hostels. Most are located in suburbs, rather than the Adelaide CBD.


Rent approximately \$130 – \$200AU per week



Student Apartments

Adelaide has a wide range of student apartments on offer in the city centre and very close to the Magill and Mawson Lakes campuses, all within close range of public transport. You can choose between studio and one bedroom apartments or share apartments. Most are recently built and fully furnished, offering a private bedroom with shared kitchen, living area and bathroom. Students negotiate sharing of household chores and expenses with fellow tenants.

Rent approximately \$150 – \$350AU per week



Residential Colleges

Residential colleges are a convenient option because the facilities generally include meals and a fully furnished single bedroom complete with a bed, desk, chair, telephone and wardrobe. Colleges often provide access to computers and the internet, library, music rooms, sporting and laundry facilities. Some even offer access to tutors. All of the residential colleges are located in North Adelaide, a 10 minute walk from the city. Residential colleges are very popular and book up quickly, so early applications six months in advance are advised.

Rent approximately \$250 – \$350AU per week

Non-Profit Housing

The Student Housing Program provides affordable accommodation to eligible tertiary students in South Australia. Administered by Housing SA, the program aims to meet the housing needs of students by providing suitable single and shared accommodation close to public transport, shops and other community services.

There's a wide range of accommodation options to choose from depending on your budget, the degree of independence you want and where you want to live.

Stay by the beach, in the CBD, the suburbs or the hills.

Private Rental

Renting privately can be a very affordable housing option if you are prepared to shop around and share with others. This is the most independent living style and particularly suits people who have lived away from home before. Although share-housing can be very rewarding, sharing your house with others can also be challenging, especially if you don't get the basics right.

Where to search:

UniSA's Rental Database is designed to make it easier for enrolled UniSA students to find housing. Your UniSA username and password (which you receive upon enrolment) is all you need to log on and search through vacancies. Log in and search at unisa.edu.au/accommodation



Other places to search for vacancies are real estate agencies and newspaper classifieds. In this option you will either rent a whole property (house, unit etc) or join a share house with your own private room and shared living areas. Chores and expenses are negotiated between fellow tenants. A great online resource for rental properties managed by real estate agents is realestateview.com.au

Rent approximately \$80 – \$250AU per week


Note: UniSA does not inspect or vet private student rental properties (including those on the rental database). It is very important that you inspect the accommodation carefully, satisfy yourself of its suitability and meet future housemates before paying money or agreeing to a lease.

Homestay/private board

Students can live in a home with a family, couple or single person, which includes your own furnished room and meals, and costs cover utilities (gas, water and electricity). This can be a very good way to familiarise yourself with your new environment and a further opportunity to practise your English. Stays can be as short as four to six weeks.

Rent approximately \$220 – \$250AU per week

Before arranging your long-term accommodation, you have the option to arrange short-term accommodation for the first week or two of your stay in Adelaide. There are a number of options from backpacker hostels to serviced apartments or affordable hotels. If you have not finalised your long-term accommodation, please ensure that you arrange a temporary option BEFORE you arrive in Adelaide. Book early to avoid disappointment – especially if arriving in the months of February and March, when Adelaide hosts a number of very popular events.
