He has been expert adviser on pension reform and the economics of demographic change to the World Bank, the United Nations Research Institute for Social Development, the British Government and the House of Lords.*



# Research at La Trobe

La Trobe University has a vibrant and diverse research community with strong academic leadership. We are internationally recognised for the quality of our research and for a research strategy that promotes innovation, specialisation and collaboration.

La Trobe University is a member of the Innovative Research Universities (IRU) Australia, an alliance committed to the promotion of collaboration in research and education which collectively attracts more than A\$340 million in funding per annum. The University also has cooperation agreements with over 80 universities around the world, many of which involve joint research activities.

All La Trobe faculties have extensive and diverse research programs, with staff and students encouraged to actively pursue their research at pre-Doctoral and post-Doctoral levels. Many of our academics have received national or international awards for their research, have extensive publication histories and make regular contributions to public debate in Australia and internationally.

Our academic staff are committed to offering world-class supervision and an *Orientation to Research* program is offered to commencing research students. A number of research scholarships are available to high achieving applicants.

## Milestones in research for La Trobe University

- Recently awarded A\$123.7 million in Federal Government funding to establish the La Trobe Institute for Molecular Science in Melbourne and the La Trobe Rural Health School in Bendigo.
- Establishment of A\$230 million Biosciences Research Centre at Melbourne (Bundoora) campus, a joint initiative with the Department of Primary Industries. The Centre will advance genomic plant and animal science and focus new generation biosciences on threats such as climate change.
- A foundation member of the Australian Synchrotron. La Trobe is signatory to a A\$2.5 million five-year beamline partnership in association with a group of South Australian universities, enabling preferential access to 30 per cent of the facility's capacity.
- Awarded funding for a new A\$30 million Federal Government medical Cooperative Research Centre, in association with a number of research bodies, institutions and pharmaceutical companies.
- The Graeme Clark Centre for Bionic Ear and Neurosensory Research, named after La Trobe's Distinguished Professor Graeme Clark, the Australian pioneer of cochlear implant research. Professor Clark and his team are spearheading the development of the next generation of high-fidelity bionic ear at the Melbourne (Bundoora) campus centre.
- Establishment of a number of new research centres, including the Centre for Consumer Law Policy and the Musculoskeletal Research Centre.

La Trobe University offers a wide range of research programs at the Master's by Research, Doctorate (Doctor of Philosophy), and Professional Doctorate level. Programs of study:

**Master by Research** - typically of one to two years' duration. Candidates must submit a thesis (not more than 60 000 words) that makes a contribution to knowledge in an approved area.

**Professional Doctorate** - involves both coursework and research components. The Professional Doctorate enables students to develop their professional practice skills to a high level.

- Candidates for Professional Doctorate by Research must submit a major thesis (not more than 75 000 words) which is a substantial and original contribution to knowledge of direct relevance to the profession, in addition to completing coursework subjects.
- Candidates for Professional Doctorate by Coursework must submit a smaller thesis (not more than 50 000 words) which is either an original or substantial contribution to knowledge of direct relevance to the profession, in addition to completing coursework subjects.
- The Professional Doctorate in Education - Doctor of Education - requires candidates to complete two 15 000 word research essays and a doctoral thesis of 50 000 words.

**Doctor of Philosophy (PhD)** - a research degree normally of three to four years' duration. A thesis (not more than 100 000 words), based on original investigations, is presented to external examiners and must be considered a substantial and original contribution to knowledge and understanding in the relevant field of study.

## Locating a research supervisor

La Trobe International understands it is often difficult for prospective research candidates to make contact with a potential supervisor prior to coming to Australia. We invite prospective research candidates to complete a research application even if prior supervision has not been confirmed, and we will hold the application while we determine whether supervision is available.

# Business, Law and Management

The Faculty of Law and Management has a sound track record in research, fostering significant research activities and industry links across numerous fields. In a 2006 survey, conducted by the Melbourne Institute of Applied Economic and Social Research, La Trobe ranked third in Victoria within the disciplines of business and economics.

Research students may undertake research within any of the Schools of the Faculty (School of Accounting, School of Economics and Finance, School of Law, School of Management, Graduate School of Management and Regional School of Business).

All research students are eligible to apply for roles such as tutors or research assistants, for up to 20 hours of work per week.

# Health Sciences and Social Work

The Faculty of Health Sciences at La Trobe University is a strong national and international performer in important applied research in the health sciences and offers a vibrant and diverse research environment.

The Faculty's research is concerned with making a difference—in lived health experiences and in the social and structural factors that affect decision-making across all levels in Australia, the Asia-Pacific, and the world.

The Faculty hosts expert multi-disciplinary research teams that address major public health issues, such as perinatal and child outcomes, reproduction, cross-cultural issues and sexual health. La Trobe University is a leader in allied health research affecting athletes and people with disabilities. There is a state-of-the-art movement analysis laboratory (the largest of its type in the southern hemisphere), which incorporates 3D motion analysis, muscle function assessment (electromyography) and balance assessment technology. Our work is strongly characterised by active engagement with end users, including community organisations, health services providers and government organisations.

Research into issues related to counselling, psychotherapy and social work is conducted across the Faculty, but concentrated mainly within the Division of Allied Health – through the Bouverie Centre, a state-wide integrated clinical, academic and consultation agency specialising in family approaches in mental health service provision, and through the School of Social Work and Social Policy.

# Our locations

La Trobe University delivers courses to international students at three main campuses across Victoria – in the cities of Melbourne, Bendigo and Albury-Wodonga, and also at Mildura and Shepparton.

## Melbourne

Melbourne has something for everyone. Regarded as the cultural capital of Australia, Melbourne was voted the world's most livable city for three years (London-based Economist Intelligence Unit 2002-2004). Travelling in and around Melbourne is easy with the public transport network including buses, trams and trains.

The city hosts various international film, arts and comedy festivals, as well as regular music performances, art exhibitions, opera, theatre programs and community festivals. The city holds major international sporting events including the Australian Tennis Championship Open, the Melbourne Cup, and Formula One Grand Prix. Melbourne is also the home of Australian Rules Football and the Melbourne Cricket Ground.

With a population of approximately 3.7 million people, originating from 153 different countries, Melbourne is famous for its multiculturalism. This is displayed in the diversity of the food and multicultural events in the city. Areas in Melbourne specialise in food and goods from different parts of the world, including China, India, Italy, the Middle East and Vietnam.

## Melbourne (Bundoora) campus

**Melbourne (Bundoora) campus student population:** more than 17 000

La Trobe's largest campus and one of the most attractive university campuses in Australia, the Melbourne (Bundoora) campus covers 232 hectares (573 acres) of stunning parkland with its own waterways and a wildlife sanctuary.

The Melbourne (Bundoora) campus is a complete community with on-campus accommodation and a full range of services including a bookshop, hairdresser, travel agent, jewelry store, printing services, weekly market, optometrist, banks, bakery, post office, theatre, cinema, convenience store and child care facilities. Restaurants and cafes on campus provide a range of food including modern Australian, European, Chinese, Japanese, Indian, vegetarian and halal.

The on-campus learning facilities are excellent, with up-to-date lecture theatres, wireless internet facilities, an impressive library, research laboratories and the La Trobe University Research and Development Park and Microsoft Centre.

Travel between central Melbourne and the campus is easy and takes about 20-30 minutes by bus or car or 50 minutes by tram.

## Bendigo campus

**Bendigo campus student population:** 3 900

The Bendigo campus is the University's second largest campus. It is situated on 33 hectares of attractive bushland, three kilometres from the Bendigo city centre and a 1.5 to 2 hour drive from Melbourne.

The Bendigo campus is a great place to meet people and establish new friendships. The size of the campus makes it easy to find your way around, get to know people and feel part of the university community.

Staff and students at the Bendigo campus have access to a full range of services and facilities. Buses run between the University, city, train station and other locations on a regular basis.

**Albury-Wodonga campus student population:** 900

La Trobe University's Albury-Wodonga campus is a major regional campus. Many students attending the campus find that its smaller size and close-knit community provide opportunities to develop lasting friendships with other students. It also offers international students more personalised attention and a safe, supportive environment for developing English language proficiency and for academic study.

The Albury-Wodonga campus offers a Student Association Building with a games area, cafe and gym. New sports grounds and an Environmental Science complex were recently completed.

# Services and facilities

## International student support services

## Library facilities

The University Library is the gateway to scholarly information for all staff and students at La Trobe. It is a central meeting place for students and a busy hub of campus life. The Library operates as one service across all campuses, housing a collection of more than 2 million books, journals, international newspapers and audiovisual resources. More than the same amount of information is provided through electronic databases, e-books and other online resources.

Campus libraries provide a wide range of services including computer workstations, wireless internet access, student training sessions on research and information skills, and friendly professional librarians to help find the best resources.

The Borchardt Library at the Melbourne (Bundoora) campus houses collections in one of the largest buildings, covering three levels and providing more than 300 computer workstations as well as printing, copying and group or quiet study areas.

The Heyward Library at the Bendigo campus and the David Mann Library at the Albury-Wodonga campus each house extensive collections of materials relating to courses at the campus and offer access to electronic and print resources of the La Trobe University Library network. Facilities and services include printing, copying, study areas, inter-library loans and a document delivery service. # Admission requirements

## Academic entry requirements

### Master by Research

Applicants must have completed an Australian Bachelor's degree with Honours at H1 or H2A level, or approved international equivalent. Applicants with Honours at H2B level, or equivalent, may be considered in some instances.

### Professional Doctorate

Applicants must have completed an Australian Master's degree or Bachelor's degree with Honours at H1 or H2A level, or approved international equivalent, plus at least three years of relevant professional experience. Applicants are also required to provide evidence of research expertise of a substantial nature.

### Doctor of Philosophy (PhD)

Applicants must have completed an Australian Master's degree or Bachelor's degree with Honours at H1 or H2A level, or approved international equivalent. Applicants are also required to provide evidence of prior research expertise of a substantial nature.

### English language requirements

International students applying for postgraduate programs must provide evidence of their English language proficiency. The IELTS requirements listed in the course tables are a guide only. Other tests and courses are also accepted by La Trobe University.

## Scholarships

# Fees and costs

## Tuition fees

Annual tuition fees vary from course to course and are listed in the Table of Courses. All tuition fees are shown in Australian dollars and are for students commencing in the 2010 academic year only. Tuition fees do not include the cost of text books, health insurance or living expenses such as food, accommodation, transport and medical costs.

**Please note** The University reserves the right to vary fees on an annual basis. Fees will not normally rise above 7 per cent, per annum. Should the University decide to increase its fees, that increase will take effect on 1 January of the following year.

## Tuition fee refund policy

Under the University's Refund Policy, La Trobe University may refund tuition fees (in whole or in part) where:

- The University can no longer provide the course being offered;
- The University ceases to provide the course after it starts but before it is completed;
- The Australian Government refuses to grant a student an initial student visa before the commencement of his or her course;
- The University withdraws an offer of a place;
- A student withdraws from his or her course prior to commencement or completion (the amount of refund, if any, will depend on when the withdrawal occurs in relation to the start of the course). If a student gives a minimum of twenty working days written notice prior to the commencement date of the course, 90 per cent of tuition fees will be refunded. If a student gives written notice after the census date for each subject they are enrolled in, no fees will be refunded. If a commencing student gives less than twenty working days written notice prior to the commencement date of the course, but gives notice on or prior to the census date of each subject, 50 per cent of tuition fees will be refunded.
- A student who received a packaged offer returns home after completing the pre-University course or transfers to another institution or simply fails to enrol in the degree course; or
- There are exceptional circumstances that compel a student to withdraw from a course after the commencement date, such as illness or disability, death of a close family member, political or civil unrest or natural disaster in the student's home country.

### 1. Select a research area and program that interests you

### 2. Check the minimum academic entry requirements

### 3. Check that you meet the English language proficiency requirements

The standard English language requirements are listed on the previous page. Some courses have higher English language requirements and these are listed in individual course descriptions at [latrobe.edu.au/coursefinder](http://latrobe.edu.au/coursefinder)

If you have not satisfied these requirements you can still apply to study at La Trobe University as the University may make you a conditional offer. This means that you will be offered a place at the University which will be reserved while you improve your English skills. Students who successfully complete the English for Further Studies Advanced Stage 5B Certificate at PG (postgraduate) level, offered by the La Trobe University International College, may enter directly into most of the University's postgraduate courses without sitting any further English tests: [latrobe.edu.au/language/courses/elicos](http://latrobe.edu.au/language/courses/elicos)

### 4. Make contact with a potential supervisor

It is necessary to identify a potential academic supervisor at La Trobe University before your application can be fully processed. Please consult Faculty, School or Departmental websites to see if you can identify a potential supervisor:

If you experience difficulties locating a prospective supervisor, and meet all other entrance requirements, we invite you to complete an application form with all supporting documents and we will try to identify a supervisor on your behalf.

**Please note:** Your application will not be processed until supervision has been confirmed.

### 5. Complete the application form

### 6. Send your application form to La Trobe International

- Completed application form
- Scanned original or certified copies of all supporting documents
- Details of payment of A\$80 non-refundable application fee.

If you are unable to apply online or scan and send your application by email, please forward your application and all supporting documents to the contact address indicated on the last page of the application form. Receipt of your application will be acknowledged by email.

### 7. Send the Academic Referee Report forms to your nominated referees

Nominate two referees who are familiar with your recent academic achievements and send the referees the Academic Referee Reports available at:

### 8. Your application will be assessed

La Trobe International will check that your application is complete and forward it to the Faculty and Higher Degrees Committee for assessment. This process will take approximately six to eight working weeks after all supporting documentation (including referee reports) have been received.

If you have applied for an EIRPS, LTUPRS or LTUFRRS you will be notified of the outcome in December or January, of the following year, by the Research and Graduate Studies Office (RGSO). Acceptance of Offer and Confirmation of Enrolment cannot be confirmed until the University has received evidence that your scholarship application has been successful.

## Closing dates for applications

Please note that if you are also applying for an Endeavour International Postgraduate Research Scholarship (EIPRS), the La Trobe University Postgraduate Research Scholarship (LTUPRS) or the La Trobe University Fee Remission Research Scholarship (LTUFRRS), your application must be received by 30 September to undertake study the following year.

## Accepting your offer and planning your arrival

If your application is successful you will receive a letter of offer, with information on how to accept your offer.

You should send your signed acceptance forms, together with the total deposit sum indicated in your letter of offer, your Overseas Student Health Cover, and, if required, your pre-visa assessment (PVA) as early as possible to La Trobe International.

If your fees are paid by a sponsor (i.e. government or organisation) you must attach a letter of guarantee written on your sponsor's official letterhead and addressed to La Trobe University.

After you have accepted your offer, La Trobe University will send you an electronic confirmation of enrolment (eCOE). You need the eCOE to apply for your student visa.

La Trobe International will also send you pre-departure information to help with your planning. Our pre-departure information contains valuable details about studying and living in Australia, including information on temporary accommodation and airport reception. This guide is available online at:

## Arriving at La Trobe University

The Language and Academic Skills Unit runs an *Orientation to Research* program for all research students who have English as an additional language.

- Academic orientation
- An examination of the similarities and differences in research expectations between your own culture and the Australian culture
- Further development of your English language skills
- Encouragement to establish dialogue between you, your supervisor and the Language and Academic Skills lecturer
- Assistance to begin writing your research proposal
- Oral presentation skills.

# Student visas

It is your responsibility to ensure you obtain a valid passport and visa before you enter Australia for study purposes. Only those who fall under Assessment Level 1 can be granted their initial student visa while in Australia. Visa assessment levels are determined by country of citizenship. Most students must obtain a student visa before coming to Australia.

**Please note** that as a condition of a student visa you are required to complete your course in the minimum time, as stated on your electronic-Confirmation of Enrolment. The University requires you to be enrolled in a full-time load, unless:

- there are “compelling or compassionate circumstances”,
- you have problems with academic progress or,
- you undertake subjects at times other than Semester 1 or 2, which count towards your course credits, e.g. during Summer School.

**Important note:** In some countries the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC) requires students to provide a minimum IELTS score as part of the student visa application process. More information is available from the DIAC website: [immi.gov.au](http://immi.gov.au)

## Health insurance (Overseas Student Health Cover)

As a condition of a student visa, all international students must have Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) before they accept their offer. OSHC provides medical and hospital cover for international students and their dependants while in Australia. La Trobe University currently has an agreement with OSHC Worldcare, a private health fund, for the provision of OSHC. La Trobe University’s policy is that students purchase health cover for the duration of their course. This one-off payment saves students needing to renew their OSHC each year and avoids any price increases during that period. **Please note** Commencing students not using OSHC Worldcare must make payment arrangements with that provider directly. If you choose to use a provider other than OSHC Worldcare you must provide proof of OSHC to La Trobe International and the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC) before your student visa is issued. ### Note for Norwegian and Swedish students

OSHC is not required for Norwegian students, as they are covered by the Norwegian National Insurance Scheme. Swedish students whose insurance is provided by CSN International do not need to take out OSHC; however, Swedish students not covered by the Swedish National Board of Student Aid must purchase OSHC.

## Employment for student visa holders

Student visas issued by the Department of Immigration and Citizenship (DIAC) prior to 26 April, 2008 were issued with condition 8101-no work, and students holding these visas will need to apply for Permission To Work at a current cost of \$A70 (2009 fee, indicative only). All visas issued after this date automatically have work permission (condition 8105-work limitation). Student visa holders can work a maximum of 20 hours per week, during gazetted University study periods, or unlimited hours during official University vacations. This includes any employment, volunteer work or work placement. The exception to this is where a placement or internship is a registered part of your course.

Research students holding an international student visa are not permitted to commence work until the official commencement of their studies at the University. Dependant spouses of research students are permitted to work unlimited hours but are also prohibited from commencing work until the primary student visa holder has commenced their course of study. NOTE: If you are studying a package of courses, your family members can only work up to 20 hours per week until you commence your Masters or PhD studies, when they can then work unlimited hours.

**However**, your partner can also study in Australia for up to 3 months. If they wish to study for more than 3 months they will have to apply separately for their own student visa and will then be subject to the work limitations of the visa granted to them. The application can be made in Australia.

**Please note** In some university courses, study demands allow little time for employment. Part-time work and vacation work may not always be available and students should not depend on these forms of income to cover living expenses or tuition fees.

## Students with school-aged children

If you have school-aged dependants accompanying you to Australia, it is a visa requirement that you enrol them in primary or secondary school and pay school fees, unless you are the recipient of an Australian government scholarship.
